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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

It seems that every winter, politicians sit around with nothing to do but figure out ways to screw the same people that put them in office. In Louisville, KY it seems after years of hunting in city parks it is now outlawed. They made some ridiculous rule about digging the turf, violates the new ruling, but at the same time the city dug up the turf to put in ball fields. In the parks you are allowed to do anything you like, any sport can be done and the park is yours to use except for detecting. Many coins were found and several pieces of jewelry were picked up. The weather was a little on the cold side for the Caribbean but everyone enjoyed themselves. Watch for next year's cruise and make plans to go.

The outing in Myrtle Beach, the first weekend in April is fast approaching and it looks like we will have a good turnout. We will hold a hunt at 11:00AM both days at Treasure Expo. Traveling by air with metal detector(s)

The question that frequently comes up is: can I take a metal detector on an airplane? Yes you can but you should follow some basic steps and guidelines. One thing to keep in mind is that the electronics on any device whether it is a metal detector or some other electronic device is very delicate and must be treated with great care. I usually travel with three detectors and all the related detecting gear. We do both competition and beach detecting with different detectors and equipment required for each detecting situations.



The following guidelines have been very successful for me so they should work for anyone.

The first thing I do is breakdown all the detectors into the greatest number of components as possible - this means if possible all electronics are removed from the handle assemblies. All the handles are broken down into three sections with the

coils removed. I also gather up all the associated tools that will be needed such as headphones (always carry a spare), target recovery tools (scoops, probes, a knife), recovery pouch, gloves, knee pads, search coils (2 different size coils for one of the detectors) and batteries.

(NOTE: If batteries are removed from equipment, black electric tape the ends over per TAS requirements).

Next select the carry on luggage that you will use to house the detector electronics, the most expensive and delicate part of the metal detector. My primary piece of luggage for this purpose is a 20"x13"x8"soft expandable carry on with rollers (see airline guidelines at the end of the article). You can usually get up to five sets of electronics in this luggage size plus a couple of coils and a headset or two. Wrap the electronics in light towel-like material and pack with care so as not to cause damage to any detector display during transportation. If by chance you should be required to check the luggage it should be packed to handle the beating it will get by the airlines.

(NOTE: No tools, metal probes or other sharp objects in the carry on, I suggest leaving out the handle assembly.)

The next step is to select a piece of luggage for all the related metal detecting gear. This gear will consist of coils, headphones, handle assemblies, recovery tools, batteries, etc. You must keep in mind the weight factor (50lbs per check in piece of luggage) and the cost of checking luggage these days. Here, I use 28"x18"x10" expandable piece of soft luggage. This should easily handle all the associated detecting gear and provide room for personal items.

My recommendation is to also provide a sheet of paper or two in each piece of luggage explaining to the TSA agent who may check the luggage what this strange looking gear (pictures on the paper explain a lot) is all about. However, the TSA agents are becoming accustomed to seeing such gear pass through their X-ray equipment so this may not be necessary. Recently, I started to carry the detectors owner's manual in the carry on luggage just in case I need to explain what the gear is to the TSA agent.

By following these steps and guidelines you should get your metal detectors safely to your destination without any problems.

Airline guidelines: Carry on luggage guidelines for flights on most US Domestic Flights, Transatlantic Flights, Flights within Europe, Asia & South Pacific, And International South American Flights. The guidelines for one carry-on bag is

(L "+ W"+H") which must equal 45 inches total, and the luggage measurements are 22 "+ 14 "+ 9" = 45" and the bag must weigh less than 40 lbs. Some US Discount Airlines require carry on luggage under 41" (20 "+13 "+8 ") and weigh less than 40 lbs.

TSA Battery Suggestion: Keep batteries and equipment with you or in carry-on baggage - not in your checked baggage! In the cabin, flight crew can better monitor conditions, and have access to the batteries or device if a fire does occur.

Legislative Arena

The year 2009 has started out with a lot of fireworks. Some of it continued from last year or originated in 2008. First of all I will recap a bit.

The omnibus federal land bill S22 passed the senate on Jan 15. It passed by a vote of 73 – 21 with all democrats voting Yes. This bill is now in the house with the same bill number. Contact your representative and ask them to vote NO. It's composed of over 150 separate land grab bills. The National Landscape Conservation System is one of them. This single bill would take over 26 million acres of land involving BLM, Forest Service, Corp of Engineers and even some private property. It will place them under National Parks regulations. This bill will seriously curtail multiple uses on 10's of millions of acres.

Next is the Clean Water Restoration Act HR2421 and S1870. It would change wording in the present law which gives the EPA and the Corp of Engineers jurisdiction of "all navigable water" to "all waters of the United States". Just think about that. The ramifications are downright frightening. It has seen no movement as of yet.

The permit bill is back again in Kentucky. HB114 this time around. It's like the energizer bunny. It just keep going and going and going. Hopefully that going will soon turn into a "gone". This bill has no support in the general legislature.

Now we address the more immediate pressing problems. You may read about them elsewhere in this newsletter but here are the highlights. Or maybe I should say lowlights!

The city of Louisville, KY has closed its parks to detecting. The clubs there have been working hard on this. They have countered every argument the city has made. An email campaign was launched across the country. As of now there is still no movement from the city. There intention is to ram through a law to prohibit it. Watch the website for more info as available.

New York City has closed two parks to detecting. This also resulted in an email and phone campaign. It got their attention. There have been a couple meetings but no agreement has been reached. The NY/NJ task force which was formed years ago to fight park closings has been working on the problem. Watch the website for details.

Lastly we have the Wisconsin DNR (Department of Natural Resources) closing off all DNR land to metal detecting. The unfortunate part of this is that the DNR has jurisdiction over all navigable waters in the state. That means that water hunting is virtually dead. The clubs have banded together to fight it. Some headway is

being made and some meetings are scheduled. They have already met with a state senator and there appears to be room for movement.

We are assisting with all these situations and hope for a positive outcome. You have probably seen emails on these with a request for you to make a contact. Please do so whenever you receive one. It only takes a few minutes. Think of it this way. The next alert and request for help that we send out could be the area YOU live in. So help out your fellow detectorists and they will help you out if something does pop up in your area. Please keep your eyes and ears open for anything affecting our great hobby and send it along to any of the officers.

On March 25th I attended a meeting of the Four Lakes Metal Detecting Club in Madison, Wisconsin. The purpose of the meeting was to see what could be done to the new policy change for a law that has been on the books since 1972. The new policy which took effect in November 2008 would stop metal detecting on all DNR land even if it wasn't designated a historical site. The recent change was made by both the State and DNR Archaeologists.

In attendance was Amy Winters, a lobbyist from Wisconsin who is helping in the efforts not only to change the new policy but also to seek legislation to make it into a law so it can't be changed every time a new administration comes into office. Also in attendance was John Broihahn the State Archaeologist, Mark

Dunzik the DRN Archaeologist, Terry Otto from Outdoor Outfitters, Mike Scott from First Texas, Other Wisconsin Clubs, about 50 members of the Four Lakes Club, Ron David, Central States Chapter President and Myself.

It seems that this new policy was adopted when someone put copper points, which have great historical value, for sale on e-bay and articles of finds in Wisconsin in the treasure magazines. Whether the law was broken or not, this doesn't look good and these agencies are monitoring these places to look out for artifacts that might have been taken illegally to help in the fight to shut our hobby down.

As ethical treasure hunters we are obligated to report these historical finds to the proper agencies for data collection. There will always be outlaws in every hobby and we are always under constant attack from these groups so we need to stay on our toes and use some common sense when detecting. Remember helping these groups can only create good will to let them know we are not the bad guys we are made out to be and this could even make for a good working relationship.

The meeting started with Amy explaining what she has already done and how she's proceeding in her efforts. She explained that this could be a long process and for everyone to exercise a little patience. She is going to keep everyone up to date on her activities and let us know when we are needed for both letter writing and petitions to help but for now she suggested for everyone to step back.

Amy was very informative with her efforts and explanations. After she finished both Archaeologists had their chance to explain their position and answer questions. After about 2 hours of questions and answers I felt that both sides were enlightened and I feel there is room for negotiations on both sides and each side may give a little to make it work. I have to give both of these Archaeologists credit for coming to the meeting knowing they were going to be grilled on this issue. Both were reasonable and willing to listen to our side and stated they would be glad to set down and maybe work out compromise on the issue.

After they left Amy spoke and was confident that change and compromise can be made. I would like to thank the Four Lake club for allowing the FMDAC to be part of this challenge. I think that working together can bring positive results.
