• Al again supplied us with great munchies for our hungry group. Thanks Al!


Hunt Master Report: Rick Costello

- 3rd Sunday Hunts: Meet at Pancake House at 21st and Broadway


The 2 winners of the Day-In-The-Park oldest coins last month were: **Ivan Miller** and **James Neeley**.

A Penny Saved is Worth How Much?

Today's pennies are copper-plated and mostly zinc. But from 1864 to mid-1982, pennies (memorial cents) were 95 percent copper and weighed 3.1 grams. It takes roughly 160 of these pennies (at 95% copper) to make 1 pound of copper.



With copper currently selling for \$3.19 a pound (Nov 2007), a **1864 to 1982 penny is actually worth a little over 2 cents** -- 200 percent above face value -- based on its copper content alone.

In 1959 the reverse (back side) of the cent was changed from Wheat Ears to the Lincoln Memorial to commemorate the 150th anniversary of Lincoln's birth and the 50th anniversary of the Lincoln cent. The composition of the coins remained unchanged. A minor change in composition was made in 1962 from 5% tin & zinc to 5% zinc; this composition remained unchanged until 1982. If you look closely at a current penny, you can see a tiny picture of Lincoln sitting inside the Lincoln Memorial.

Copper Statistics

- Copper is one of the oldest metals ever used and was an important material in the development of human civilization
- It has become a major industrial metal, ranking third after iron and aluminum in terms of quantities consumed
- It is a better conductor of heat and electricity than any other metal except silver. Electrical applications such as power transmission and generation, building wiring and telecommunications, account for about three-quarters of total copper usage
- Copper turns green when it reacts with atmospheric pollutants and corrodes
- The Statue of Liberty contains 31 tons of copper
- At any given time, an estimated \$10.5 billion in coins sit idly while increasing in value in US homes.

The weight and copper content of U.S. pennies have been reduced since their introduction in the late 18th century.



1793-95: pure copper; weighs 13.48 grams.

1795-1857: pure copper; weighs 10.89 grams.

1857-64: 88 percent copper, 12 percent nickel; weighs 4.67 grams.

1864-1982*: 95 percent copper; weighs 3.11 grams.

1982-present: 97.5 percent zinc, 2.5 percent copper; weighs 2.5 grams.

* Most pennies minted in 1943 were made of zinc-coated steel due to heavy demand for copper during World War II.

Question: How many pennies are made each year?

Answer: "It costs the government 1.4 cents for every penny produced. Multiply that by 7 to 8 billion pennies made each year and it comes to a yearly \$20 million loss."
